

# Revised COVID-19 Health and Safety Plan

Prepared for the 2023-2024 Academic Year

Initial Adoption: July 2021 Last Revision: February 2024

#### Introduction

The following Health and Safety Plan for the Allegheny Intermediate Unit (AIU) was prepared in accordance with guidance from the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Pennsylvania Department of Health (DOH).

The plan reflects guidance through May 2023. The plan is subject to change in accordance with updated guidance of the relevant public health from the CDC and PADOH. Any changes will be reflected in plan revisions by the AIU administration, subject to approval by the Board of Directors.

The plan applies to all AIU divisions. The universality of protocols and the streamlined processes developed and refined throughout the pandemic allow for a concise document that outlines the procedures the AIU will follow, while providing the flexibility to adapt to changing conditions.

This plan replaces the Revised COVID-19 School Reopening Health and Safety Plan adopted on July 27, 2021.

- 1. How will the local education agency (LEA), to the greatest extent practicable, support prevention and mitigation policies in line with the most up-to-date guidance from the CDC for the reopening and operation of school facilities in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning?
  - a. The AIU supports prevention and mitigation policies in a number of ways:
    - i. Through a continued partnership with the Allegheny County Health Department (ACHD), the AIU will regularly consult with public health officials on positive cases, exposures, mitigation strategies and interpretation of the most up-to-date CDC guidance.
    - ii. The AIU will communicate this plan as well as specific details of the mitigation strategies contained herein in several ways:
      - 1. Posting on the AIU website and employee intranet (InSite).
      - 2. Summarization and review of the plan at employee in-service workshops at the start of the 2023-2024 school year.
      - 3. Communication to parents from AIU programs outlining expectations for students and the mitigation plans adopted in each facility operated by the AIU.

- iii. As the school year progresses, the AIU will continue to monitor local conditions and CDC guidance. Changes to the mitigation plans will reflect the best information regarding the local situation, determined in consultation with local health officials and the latest CDC guidance.
- 2. How will the LEA ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address the students' academic needs, and students' and staff members' social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services?
  - a. The AIU will continue to ensure continuity of services in a variety of ways:
    - i. All of the AIU's special education programs continue to operate in person, except when closed to comply with government mandated closure and/or mitigation strategies. When needed and appropriate, hybrid and remote learning options for service delivery are provided when medical necessity is pre-determined by a healthcare provider and agreed upon by students' IEP teams. This is due to the significant needs of the children served by the AIU.
    - ii. When programs or individual classes administered by any AIU division must provide services remotely, students are provided with the necessary learning resources. At-home resources include iPads, adaptive technology and learning packets. All services provided in the home will transition to remote services should a resurgence occur and/or local or state mandates dictate remote services.
    - iii. Programs and individual classes administered by the AIU and hosted in public or non-public school buildings will be provided in accordance with the instructional model (inperson, remote, hybrid) of the school entity in which the services are provided.
    - iv. The AIU will continue to follow the recommended guidance of all relevant regulatory and advisory agencies including the CDC, PADOH, ACHD, and the Pennsylvania Office of Child Development and Early Learning.

a. Universal and correct wearing of masks;	On February 25, 2022, the CDC issued revised guidelines regarding masks. On May 11, 2023, the CDC changed Community Admission Level to Hospital Level. As such, and in conjunction with the CDC's revised guidelines, the AIU will adopt the following procedures for masks across the organization:  • Unless required by a host location's health and safety plan, masking will generally be optional for AIU employees when Allegheny County's COVID-19 Hospital Admission Level is "Low "or "Medium," as calculated by the CDC. Masking will be required if Allegheny County's COVID-19 Hospital Admission Level is "High" or if otherwise recommended by the CDC.  • The administration reserves the right to require employees in any program to mask in special circumstances, such as those involving medically fragile students or clients.
b. Modifying facilities to allow for physical distancing (e.g., use of cohorts/podding);	The AIU will follow the most current recommended guidelines established by the CDC regarding physical distancing in educational settings.

 Handwashing is taught in classrooms and reinforced by Handwashing and signage in AIU schools and program locations. respiratory etiquette; Signs are posted in the AIU Central Office restrooms reminding staff of proper handwashing techniques. Students are taught to cover their mouths when they cough and/or to cough into their arms. Water fountains in all schools, program locations and Central Office are shut off. Students and staff may bring water bottles. Where equipped, bottle filling stations are available. d. Cleaning and maintaining healthy All AIU sites, including the Central Office, Special Educations facilities, including improving Schools, Community Centers, and Pre-school/Early Childhood ventilation; program sites are cleaned daily, with attention focused on high touch areas. • In cases of a COVID-19 outbreak at a particular site, the affected area is thoroughly cleaned by the custodial staff. e. Contact tracing in combination A contact tracing protocol is in place to manage close contacts and with isolation and quarantine, exposures among our student population: in collaboration with the State Parents/guardians of students who test positive for COVID are and local health departments; requested to inform their child's teacher, who will then notify the immediate supervisor. Close contacts among students will be notified by program staff.

g. Efforts to provide vaccinations to school communities;	The AIU continues to encourage employees and students to get vaccinated and stay current with booster shote as per CDC recommendations.

Appropriate accommodations for students with disabilities with respect to health and safety policies; and	<ul> <li>As the AIU-operated schools and many of our programs are specifically designed to serve students with special needs, accommodations for these students are built into each program.</li> </ul>
i. Coordination with state and local health officials.	<ul> <li>The AIU has a well-established partnership with the ACHD.</li> <li>The AIU has established relationships with local healthcare providers: Allegheny Health Network, University of Pittsburgh Medical Center, and Highmark Blue Cross Blue Shield.</li> </ul>
