According to the U.S. Census, 18.4 million children do not have a biological father, step-father, or adoptive father at home.

Impacts of Absent Fathers

When a child is raised in a home without a father, they face the following problems:

2x Greater Risk of Infant Mortality

2x Greater Risk of Dropping Out of School

2x More Likely To Suffer Obesity

4x More Likely to Experience Poverty

7x Greater Risk of Teen Pregnancy
