ALLEGHENY INTERMEDIATE UNIT BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Election 2024

The Allegheny Intermediate Unit (AIU) provides an array of high-quality, cost-effective educational services and supports for learners of all ages in Allegheny County. The AIU is one of the largest of the Commonwealth's 29 intermediate units and is led by a 13-member board elected by the school directors from the 42 suburban school districts in the county.

Seven members from district school boards within the AIU have submitted the required documentation for candidacy for the four, three-year board positions, July 2024 to June 2027; the one, two-year position, July 2024 to June 2026; the one, one-year position, July 2024 to June 2025. The top four vote getters will receive the four three-year positions; the number five vote getter will take the one two-year position; and the number six vote getter will get the one one-year position. AIU Board members are responsible to all suburban school districts in Allegheny County; therefore, the 378 school directors from these districts are eligible to elect candidates to the AIU Board.

JACKIE BLAKEY-TATE – Penn Hills School District

I was recently reelected to my second term as a Penn Hills School Director; I currently serve as Board Vice-President. Prior to retirement as a high school administrator with Pittsburgh Public Schools I worked in student services Pre-K-12. Much of my career was in alternative education. As a retiree I felt the need to share my knowledge and talents to continue advocating for systems which provide quality educational opportunities for all students. It is the responsibility of school districts to ensure that students reach their greatest potential and become contributing members to society. Additionally, we must provide educators with professional development and support necessary to equip them to meet the needs of today's students and their families. My early education was in the Pittsburgh and Wilkesburg Public School systems, I later obtained a B.A. in Sociology and Secondary Education, Certifications as a Home and School Visitor (School Social Worker) and as a Secondary Principal, and a M.Ed. in Counselor Education. I remain involved and volunteer with current and retired educator organizations.

Frank received his bachelor's degree in secondary education and taught in public schools for six years. Additionally, he has coached a variety of high school sports for the past 40 years. Frank became involved in law enforcement and is currently a police sergeant at Duquesne University. He has served on the board of directors for both the Allegheny County Borough Association as well as the Pennsylvania Association of Boroughs. Frank has been an advocate for special education, participating in a number of programs through St. Anthony's School as well as the Best Buddies Program at Duquesne University.

RIKELL FORD – Clairton City School District

Dr. Rikell S. Ford is a lifelong resident of the Mon Valley. Growing up in the City of Clairton she attended Clairton City School District from grades K-12, studied Criminal Justice at Edinboro University, completed a Master of Arts in Criminal Justice Administration at California University of Pennsylvania (2009), achieved a Master of Social Work with a certificate in Child Welfare from the University of Pittsburgh (2017), and a Doctorate in Community Engagement from Point Park University (2022). As a Licensed Social Worker, she has spent over 12 years in many roles with the Allegheny County Department of Human Services-Children, Youth, and Families; her current role is Casework Supervisor. She is an adjunct professor at Point Park University in the Community Engagement Department, and a mental health therapist who provides therapeutic intervention to individuals who have experienced complex trauma.

Dr. Rikell is the proud founder of Kindred C.U.L.T.U.R.E., a non-profit focused on serving communities in the Mon Valley area, and can be found with her youth program Clairton Healthy Adolescence Moving into Power and Service (C.H.A.M.P.S.) working with teenagers to change the narrative of the youth in Clairton. She is past Vice President of Foundation of HOPE Board of Directors, current President of Clairton City School District Board, and a board member of Focus on Renewal. She has served in local and statewide positions with Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc. including state mental health coordinator. Rikell serves as advisor to Clairton Cares, led the CommUNITY Day since 2014, is Secretary to the Western PA Youth Athlete Association, and can often be found stepping in as a cheer coach utilizing the opportunity to mentor young girls. Dr. Ford was inducted into The New Pittsburgh Courier's Class of 2022 Feb 40 Under 40 and is a participant in Leadership Pittsburgh.

Why I want to serve on the AIU Board

I aspire to contribute as a board member to advocate for equitable representation of all students within the districts served by the AIU. I firmly believe that every student deserves a voice to express their perspectives on a larger scale. Prior to this, Antonio worked for a year at Burns White for the railroad practice group and before that, a yearlong internship at the Federal Public Defender's office. When not working or going to school, he is involved with his fraternity and serves as the Chapter Advisor to his collegiate fraternity at Carnegie Mellon University.

My working with students has always been ingrained in me. Being an orientation leader in college, being an advisor working with my fraternity at CMU, or even chairing recent model UN and mock trial competitions, all shows my dedication to youth. 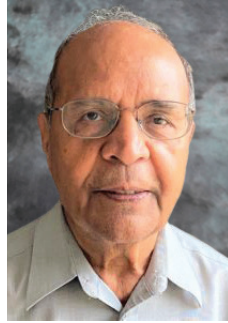
